Our Rabbi Reflects



Upholding Our American and Jewish Values

The juxtaposition of holidays in July and August provides us the opportunity to consider those values that we hold dearest and to think about what we can do to uphold them.

On July 4, we celebrate Independence Day, the ultimate celebration of the establishment of our nation, first by separating from Great Britain, and secondly by defending our right to that separation and asserting our independence. Our continued existence was no sure thing early on; a betting man would not have wagered on our persistence into the

21st Century. And yet, here we remain, having weathered not only the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812, in which our very existence was again jeopardized, but a devastating Civil War, which challenged our status as a single republic. We became a world player in later wars, dominating in two World Wars until we are seen as one of, if not the sole, great power on Earth.

How did we get this far? We have strived to consistently uphold those values originally articulated by our founding fathers and have made them the bedrock of our democracy. They have strengthened our resolve to defeat every foe and to work continually to perfect our society. And we have generally succeeded; our laws now provide more freedom and more opportunity for a greater number of Americans than ever before, as equality continues its progress towards guaranteeing equal rights for all Americans.

Now, however, I fear we have begun to recede, and that lessening of our power and resolve is largely of our own doing. We would do well to heed the warnings provided by our particular history as the Jewish people, for this two-month period also marks the saddest day on the Jewish calendar, Tisha B'Av, the ninth of the month of Av. It begins this year after Shabbat on August 13. According to tradition, on that day, both holy temples were destroyed (the first temple, built by Solomon, and destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 BCE, and the second, begun by the returnees from Babylonia and improved upon until its destruction by the Romans in 70 CE).

The geopolitical reasons for both calamities are not hard to understand, but trying to reconcile these tragedies religiously is more difficult. If the Temple was the place where we worshipped G-d, why would G-d allow them to be destroyed? Aside from the issue of what we consider G-d to be and how G-d operates, we need to analyze our part in the destruction. The rabbis say the Second Temple fell because of *sinat chinam*, baseless hatred. The divisiveness of First Century Judea and its monumental stresses had turned us into a people at each others' throats, some supporting the Romans, others rebelling against them, and some fleeing to the desert to live a monastic existence.

We Americans, I fear, are beginning to succumb to *sinat chinam*. Our political divisiveness is now at fever pitch, threatening the very unity of our nation. We are no longer broken along the Civil War color lines of the Blue and the Gray; we are now split between being Red states and Blue states, with the divisions between them rancorous and hateful.

Ohev Tzedek – Shaarei Torah is hosting a scholar-in-residence during the weekend of July 9-10. Nehemia Gordon is a Biblical scholar and one of the translators of the Dead Sea Scrolls. He also has a website, Nehemia's Wall, which provides links to his various internet blogs as well as to his published works.

Gordon, son of an Orthodox rabbi, is also one of the 50,000 Karaite Jews in the world. Their beliefs profess that each person should read the Torah and develop their own ideas of how to live as a good Jew rather than to follow the *halacha* (Jewish Law) in the Talmud and in later rabbinic works.

He will be delivering the sermon at Shabbat services on July 9, and joining the Torah study following the service. Services begin at 9:45 A.M.

On Sunday, Gordon will be lecturing at 10:30 A.M. on the topic of "The Dead Sea Scrolls as Viewed Through the Eyes of a Karaite Jew." A light brunch is provided.

Both events will take place at the Temple located at 5245 Glenwood Avenue in Boardman. Reservations need to be made by calling the Temple office at 330-758-2321. The service is free, and the Sunday event will have a \$10.00 fee to help cover costs. Reservations are due by July 6.

Message from Our President



WHERE WE GO FROM HERE

For me, the High Holidays are in many ways, every day in the life of my beloved Ohev Tzedek. Language may fail; photographs fade; minds are fallible, and details are sometimes lost. But, some experiences never dim; they stand out in our memories, even after decades, as a wall of flame.

As I also said in one of my recent letters to you, I love Ohev Tzedek for the good times in our lives together, but also for the sad times. Only your synagogue can do so much to cloak you with love and care, when you need these things the most.

Now, it’s onward and upward. With hope and planning, everything is possible.

Social issues, such as access to abortion, recognition of gay and transgender rights, and protection of the fundamental separation of church and state, threaten to split us apart now as slavery, economic, and states' rights issues once did. The debate on these is no longer constructive and well-mannered, with reasoned arguments having fallen victim to the ignorance and depravity of talk radio and its vicious TV counterparts.

We, the Jewish People, alone cannot cure these ills, but we can contribute to their solution by doing what we have always done best: teaching and modeling the best that our tradition has to offer in terms of basic morality, focusing on moral leadership and positive civil discourse, and calling out and protesting injustice wherever we find it. In this election year, which presents the starkest contrast between candidates that has perhaps ever been seen, we must roll up our sleeves and join in the work of protecting our country. Only in that way can we say that we have lived according to our most cherished values and not shirked our responsibility towards our country and towards our particular Jewish people and civilization.

A New Look

For the first time in our shul's history, we have elected co-presidents. While a unique idea for our temple, other area synagogues have experimented with this idea and it has worked well. In fact, it makes a great deal of sense.

With the declining Jewish population in the Mahoning Valley, and the same number if not more, meetings to attend, it makes coverage of the meetings, and participation in community activities much easier.

Other necessary changes are also on the horizon. This past year has seen many problems arise in the infrastructure of our physical facility. Water leaks, gas leaks, and some general breakdowns have forced us to look hard at needed renovations to our Temple.

For example, we will have to make improvements to our heating and cooling systems before they become unworkable. We have an outside stairwell wall that is on the verge of collapse. And the energy bills are rising despite the rather mild winter. We have been in this building for over fifty years, and upgrades are overdue.

Thanks to a very significant donation, the kitchen that still had original equipment, windows, cabinets, flooring, lighting, etc. is well on its way to a complete renovation.

But unfortunately, we are still facing more significant problems.

After discussion with members of the board, and between ourselves, we are going to propose the following actions:

1. To start a capital improvement campaign to raise the money to repair these problems.
2. Repairs will be made as we go along on a prioritized basis, similar to triage.
3. Because of the costs, which we are evaluating at this time, and the financial situation we are experiencing, we are going to request donations and then we will match these donations dollar for dollar with money from our endowment funds.
4. We are also looking to implement an energy audit, and a budget review.

We have talked about our problems, but we also have some exciting plans. New programs we are going to introduce include some social activities and just plain fun. Some of the ideas are movie nights; picnics; pottery paint and bake, challah, matzah, and hamantachen baking; game nights; and another popular program sip and paint.

For a long time, we have been the "Hamesh" place in Youngstown, well Boardman, and we want very much to continue in this tradition. We will be proposing these ideas to the board, and will need the help of all our congregants to make our term as co-presidents a success.
