Our Rabbi Reflects



Moving Forward as Jews and as Americans

As I write this article in late October, with the presidential election less than three weeks away, I worry greatly about our future. Anyone who knows me at all already knows who I want to see elected, so I need not (and would not) say it here. However, I find that I must articulate key American and Jewish values that must be upheld if we are to continue to function as a nation and if we, as Jews, are to retain our overall feeling of not merely acceptance but of being an essential part of the fabric of our nation. If certain forces that are currently rising across the country in response to this election gain the upper hand, those values will be seriously, perhaps fatally, undermined.

Tolerance: Although this word is much maligned, it attempts to express the idea that all citizens can and should be equal under the law in the United States. The Torah commands us in no uncertain terms to “love your neighbor as you love yourself.” Every Shabbat, we pray, “May citizens of all races and creeds forge a common bond in true harmony, to banish hatred and bigotry, and to safeguard the ideals and free institutions that are the pride and glory of our country.” That very ideal, that of “liberty and justice for all,” is today under attack, and we as Jews, no matter what political party we might now or have ever supported, must fight to uphold it. The founding fathers understood this concept (although in a somewhat attenuated way) and built the nation on that foundation, enabling it to eventually begin to move beyond the inequities that existed in their age.

Equal Rights and Equal Opportunities: Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan articulated belief in G-d as “the Power that makes for Salvation.” As such, G-d as a force and as a concept, motivates us to help move the world towards greater and greater love, fulfillment, and justice for all. Our championing of equal rights and equal opportunity for all Americans cannot, therefore, simply be passive – “*tzedek, tzedek tirdof*” we are commanded – “justice (and only) justice you must pursue.” Unless all are equal, none are – this is not a mere pithy saying, it is a fundamental truth, and we cannot do G-d’s work in this world unless we are actively pursuing that goal. As responsible Americans and as Jews, we must endorse the candidate who is most likely to pursue it as well.

Truth and Love of Learning: *Emet* (truth) is among the highest of ideals within Judaism; bridging from the end of the third paragraph of the Shema to the prayers that follow, we read *Hashem Eloheichem Emet* – the Lord your G-d is Truth. Identifying G-d with truth establishes how crucial it is to the very existence of humankind and to our relationship with G-d. When facts themselves are ignored in discussion, when learning is denigrated, when ignorance and unfounded opinion are celebrated over knowledge, learning, and truth, our civilization itself is threatened.

Restraint: “Who is mighty? He that subdues his passions, as it is said, ‘He that is slow to anger is better than the mighty.’” So says the Sayings of the Sages (*Pirkei Avot* 4:1). Simple restraint, dignity, and common decency have taken a beating during this election cycle. The next president will have to work to restore the balance we will need to function even adequately. When respect, civility, and consideration of others reenter

Christmakah Musings

As I walked into a store the other day, I saw that they already had Christmas decorations up. Since school had just started and we hadn't even gotten through the High Holy days, this was a little bit of a shocker. Then a little bit of panic ran through me. Panic of the "holiday" season. A hundred thoughts ran through my mind. *Where am I going to get enough Chanukah candles for my family? Where am I going to get enough Chanukah gelt for my family of seven (my in-laws always participate)? How many school events are going to interfere with Chanukah?*

OH! The school! My school district has a total of three Jewish students; all three are my children. They teach Christmas around the world. They try as hard as they can to teach about Kwanza and Chanukah. So, every year since RJ was in kindergarten, I go into the school for any teacher that asks (especially the teachers that have my children) and try to explain what Chanukah is: what the story is, how we celebrate, and what a *chanukiah* is. Of course, I have to treat my children's classes to latkes, donuts, gelt, and a game of dreidel.

Like many of us in the community, I have a blended family. I was raised in a Conservative Jewish household, and my husband was raised in a Christian household. I was raised in a household where I was taught that you buy someone a present because you saw something that reminded you of them, not because the calendar tells you to. However, my husband was raised with presents being exchanged during the Christmas season. Even after twenty-some years of being with my husband and being so welcomed by his parents, Christmas is still foreign to me. So the thought rises of how many Chanukah presents do I get my children? Not really a true tradition of the holiday, but an American tradition since it falls so close to Christmas. A lot of stress for a fun time of year.

As I drove home, I remembered when RJ was little. I had gotten him a remote control car for Chanukah. He was so excited to get eight presents, one for each night. Little did he know that Ron and I had already agreed that we would do one Chanukah present since he was going to get a lot of other presents from his grandparents. Not wanting to disappoint him, I took apart the car and gave him a different part each night, so on the final night he could enjoy his present. That memory made me remember how joyous and fun the holiday is.

Since we do not take ourselves very seriously, we have had many jokes through the years about celebrating both holidays. There was a joke in my town for a few years that if you want to see a lot of Christmas lights go to the Jews' house. (We live in a small town - everyone knows everyone and where they live.) We used to have a giant blow-up dreidel among the Christmas lights. My kids had a small blue fake Christmas tree that they would decorate with silver ornaments. They, of course, called it their Chanukah bush, so Hanukkah Harry would know where to leave their gifts.

Once I got home, I looked at the calendar and what a wonderful surprise! For the first time in many years, the entire holiday of Chanukah falls during "winter break." No homework, no Christmas concerts at the school they need to participate in, no practices. NO WORRIES. So I look forward to lighting our candles, playing dreidel, and celebrating at our Temple Chanukah party. But most of all I look forward to celebrating the time with my family.

the realm of political discourse, we will begin to address our many challenges, but until they do, we are adrift.

Reconciliation: In attempting to begin to heal the massive wounds suffered in our Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln said in his second inaugural address, a mere month before his death by an assassin’s bullet, “With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation’s wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations.” In the Psalms (133:1), we read, “*Hinei mah tov umah na’im shevet achim gam yachad* – Behold how good and pleasant it is for “brothers” to dwell together.” The strife we have witnessed, while it has not devolved into a civil war, thank G-d, must end, and all Americans must be reconciled to the outcome of the election and with each other, no matter the result.

Democracy: Can a religion that features a prayer for the return of “*malchut bet David avdecha* – the kingship of the House of David, your servant” and the people who would pray such a prayer be called the main advocate for democracy? Are Judaism and democracy antithetical? Certainly not, according to political scientist Daniel J. Elazar, z”l, who, in his article “Judaism and Democracy: The Reality”:

“Democracy can be understood as having at least two dimensions: 1) self-government, that is to say, meaningful participation of individual citizens in the establishment of the polity in which they live and in its subsequent governance; 2) pluralism, that is to say, the right of every individual to develop for him or herself a way of life and a set of beliefs and opinions appropriate to it, consistent with agreed upon common norms, and to live accordingly, with minimum interference on the part of others, including and especially, on the part of government.”

Judaism passes the compatibility test for both main dimensions; of self-government, Elazar said:

“When it comes to democracy as self-government, the relationship is very positive indeed. The classic Jewish political tradition of the Bible makes it clear that sovereignty is God’s but that day-to-day governance is in the hands of the people within the framework of the Divine constitution. God and the people established an initial relationship through covenant, and God played the major role in setting forth the constitution, especially the religious and moral constitution of the people.”

The same can be said generally of Judaism in relationship to pluralism: “Judaism accepts a degree of pluralism for Jews within the framework of Torah but not outside of it. With regard to democracy and pluralism, then, the relationship between Judaism and democracy is a qualified positive.” Why qualified? Because Biblical Judaism condemns paganism among the Jews and among the nations as well. However, we are not to act as G-d’s policemen in enforcing monotheism, except among ourselves. Whenever and wherever Jews have wielded power since the destruction of the Second Temple, democracy has been the basis of government. It is the basis of the Israeli government, which is the only democracy in the Middle East (and a fractious one, at that).

A strong democracy relies on reinforcement of all of its tenets, and a smooth transfer of control after an election is what separates a democracy from an autocracy. As Jews and as Americans, we must vote for the candidate who unequivocally endorses a smooth transfer of power.

May we all be blessed with wisdom as we exercise our sacred right to vote, and may we choose wisely.

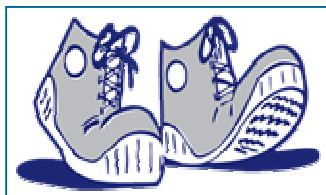
